

OVERVIEW

Enjoy a relaxed walk following the cascade of the Thredbo River. Hear the calming sounds of the Snowy Mountains as the river runs strong in springtime with the snowmelt from the upper mountains. On a warm day, bring your swimmers and cool off in the refreshing water.

Halfway along the circuit continue around to the scenic loop of Australia's highest golf course. This section has some uneven, rocky surfaces before you enter Crackenback Ridge residential area.

THREDBO RIVER

Home to native fauna including the platypus, the river begins upstream at 1550m elevation, below South Ramshead.

It cascades down 649 metres over a span of 40km to join the Snowy River at Lake Jindabyne.

Thredbo River is the water source for Thredbo Village and the resort's snowmaking in winter. The biological and physical condition of Thredbo River is closely studied by the University of Canberra Institute for Applied Ecology in conjunction with Thredbo to closely monitor our precious ecosystem.

GOLF COURSE WOODLAND

Riparian Heathland is a diverse shrub community occupying this area made up of native shrubs of all sizes.

The Mountain Plum pine, Alpine Bottlebrush and Mountain Tea-tree make this zone ideal for birds and insects.

Look out for the Flame Robins along the way. Even with their small 14cm stature, they are easily identified by their orange-red throat and upper body as they dart through the undergrowth. This endemic species nests in the shelter of stumps and banks in moist woodland and on ridges and slopes up to 1800m.
